

Jan Hopkins' May Presentation Reviewed by Lars Husby

Jan Hopkins made a stunning presentation for NWDC members and guests Wednesday, May 11th. She talked about her history, beginning in 1984 making traditional baskets, moving to Seattle from Los Angeles in 1988, making baskets using the Appalacian technique with red cedar bark and then adding other materials including palm seed stalks, palm fronds and grasses. In the 90's, she added black bamboo and waxed linen, studied Haida basketry and began working with the inner bark from the Alaska yellow cedar tree and adding other natural materials to her inventory that included agave, lotus pods, eel grass, magnolia leaves, orange and grapefruit peels, leaf skeletons, and Lunaria (Silver Dollar plant). She also collected salmon and halibut skins, philodendron leaves, cantaloupe peels, and dried artichokes. She claims to have an obsession for natural materials and has gone to great lengths to collect them, some of which included dumpster diving. Other materials she's used include acorns (knotted together), emu eggs, watermelon peel, and garden prunings. Other techniques she's worked in include plaiting and double wall.

In 1999, she began to create sculptural torsos inspired by costumes from the LION KING, which were shown at SOFA, New York. In 2004, she created a 6' 2" figure from agave leaves and cedar bark that collapsed and had to be reinforced. The figures that followed celebrated iconic women including Marilyn Monroe, Gertrude Stein, Frieda Kahlo, and more. Her work is included in the Johnson and Johnson Collection and the Racine Museum. A teapot and cup piece that was exhibited at BAM ended up in the Kamm Teapot Collection.

She received a grant to travel to Borneo and New Zealand and was inspired by Papua New Guinea art she viewed in New York. More recently she received another grant from 4 Culture. Currently, she is working and collaborating with her husband, Chris, to produce commentary work inspired from WWII Japanese internment camps. We all hope we'll be able to view this work in an area museum. Lars Husby

News from Co-President Julie Lowther

The BIG exciting news to report this month is that NWDC now has a YouTube channel. This has been in the works for a bit, and was given a healthy push by Jan Koutsky, who came to the board to discuss the fact that DVD's seem to be following 8-track tapes into extinction. Jan was concerned about two things, 1) that the Living Treasures films were only available as DVD's, which meant their utility and reach will continue to diminish, and 2) that the archived master versions of the films were in a format that is also teetering on the brink of oblivion. She suggested that we have the archived film masters converted to digital masters, and at the same time create versions of these digital files that would be suitable for streaming online. Her suggestions were greeted with enthusiastic support from the board, and acted upon forthwith.

In the past, NWDC has sold copies of the DVD's of the 7 Living Treasures films. After much discussion, and consultation with the original stakeholders and progenitors of the Living Treasures Project, the board decided to make the films available for people to watch for FREE through the medium of online video streaming.

To honor the recent passing of a giant in the Seattle art world, the first of the Living Treasures films to be made available on the NWDC YouTube channel is: Anne Gould Hauberg - Visionary



STUDY GLASS IN ISTANBUL, TURKEY! "BLOWING KILN-FORMED GLASS" INSTRUCTORS: MARK DITZLER & JANET DALECKI AUGUST 2 - 13, 2016 Session 3 (2 Week Intensive)



Please join us at The Glass Furnace, Turkey's first school dedicated only to glass.

The Glass Furnace is located 25 km. from Istanbul, in the countryside near the Black Sea. The school features a large hot shop, flame working, fusing and cold glass studios. Students will enjoy a nice dormitory, lounge area, cafeteria, river-side deck, and swimming pool (nice to have in August)! Situated where Europe meets Asia, Istanbul is a friendly, modern city with a tremendous amount of history! It will be Mark's 3rd time teaching in this amazing place, one of the most interesting in Europe!

Our class is designed for artists who would like to learn how to combine kiln-forming and fusing with glass blowing. Students will learn to make cane, murrini and other "design elements" in the hot shop. We'll also demonstrate many fusing techniques including pattern bars, flame worked inclusions, screen-printed enamels, and using foils and lusters. We'll use both studios to make these "design elements", then put them together in a final "roll-up", blown in the hot shop, or fused in the kiln.

The instructors specialize in bringing "cross-over" techniques from different artistic disciplines to the studio, providing an opportunity for students to develop their own personal aesthetic in glass. Mark and Janet taught a similar class at the Studio of the Corning Museum in February 2016, and Mark has taught this class with different co-teachers at least 8 times at the Corning Studio.

*Please note: No prior kiln forming experience is needed, but 1 year of glass blowing experience is required.

This is a great opportunity to learn new glass techniques while experiencing a colorful culture where East literally meets West. Please join us for an unforgettable experience of art and culture. Edric Ong from Kuching, the East Malaysian state of Sarawak (Borneo), is an internationally recognized textile authority, scholar, author, and award winning fashion designer whose designs are based on Borneo indigenous peoples' motifs, handcrafted of woven silk and other natural fabrics, using natural dyes and hand block printed or hand painted batik. Edric is world renowned for his work in supporting and sustaining the traditional arts and crafts of indigenous peoples.

This year Edric is bringing three other artists from Sarawak. They are Mathew Ngau Jau, musician and dancer, Nancy Ngali, Iban weaver & dancer, and Senia Jugi, Iban rattan, bamboo and bemban weaver. Nancy's work has been awarded UNESCO's "Seal of Excellence." Mathew is a Kenyah musician, singer, dancer, painter and blowpipe marksman. He is a "National Heritage" in his homeland. In addition to the talk, there will be traditional music and dance by Nancy and Mathew. Senia's works have received the UNESCO-World Crafts Council Award of Excellence. She will demonstrate basket weaving.

Seven NWDC Fiber Artists Featured in SDA Washington Exhibition

Seven NWDC fiber artists have been selected to exhibit in Fiber Fusion, a juried exhibition of Washington state members of the Surface Design Association. The show will travel to four venues: Allied Arts in Richland in June 2016, VALA in Redmond in November 2016, Northwind Arts Center in Port Townsend in February 2017, and the Schack Art Center in Everett in March 2017. The seven artists are:

Nancy Loorem Adams, Lanny Bergner, Danielle Bodine, Dorothy McGuiness, Patricia Resseguie, Sharon Rowley and Larkin Jean Van Horn.

Balance and Tension: The Furniture of Seth Rolland opening at the Bellevue Arts Museum, Bellevue, WA showcases the work of NWDC member Seth Rolland. The show runs from May 20th – August 14th, with the Opening Reception from 7:30 – 10:00 pm on Thursday, May 19th. The Artist Talk is Wednesday, June 15th at 6:30pm. Exhibit hours are Tuesday through Sunday, 11 am – 6 pm

Seth Rolland finds inspiration for his furniture in the architecture of the natural world. Geological formations slowly carved by the flow of water, the swarming legs of an insect, the growth pattern of tree roots, and the heft of cobbles on the beach all converge to inform his work. Rolland reduces nature's complexity to its defining elements, which he then integrates into his designs. Through a process of reduction and abstraction, his furniture becomes suggestive of nature's patterns as shaped by the tension and balance of the forces at play.

The three artworks in the exhibition, *Leaf Stack #11*, *Leaf Stack #13*, and *Leaf Stack #15*, all incorporate fabrics hand-dyed by the artist. They are machine pieced and stitched, with the exception of *Leaf Stack #11* which is machine pieced, but consists of free-motion stitching. Deep mosses grow over these leaving mysterious, dark, internal spaces in which all sorts of things live and grow. Each of the pieces is made with over seven miles of processed silk thread.

Director of Curatorial Affairs, Stefano Catalani selected fiber artist Patricia Resseguie as the next NWDC artist to exhibit work in the lobby of Bellevue Arts Museum. In partnership with BAM, a lobby vitrine is dedicated to feature work by NWDC artists.


