## President's Note

### **President's Letter**

The new Officers of NWDC sincerely appreciate that you endorsed us as leaders over the next two years. I am terrifically excited to be working with this exceptional team who bring backgrounds in business, budgeting, education, project management, and of course, successful art practices. With the support of an experienced set of Committee Chairs, we have the resources to build upon the 62-year legacy that makes NWDC NWDC.

From a personal viewpoint, it will be intriguing to serve as President of NWDC. I feel somewhat in familiar territory. I well remember watching the Ed Sullivan Show when Erich Brenn would start spinning plates on long, thin poles. (The act replays on YouTube now.) He'd get several going at a time racing from pole to pole to set the plates spinning again before they could topple. I had no greater ambition at age 7 than to become a plate spinner. 
## Meeting Announcement Board Meeting on Tuesday, February 6

## New Book on John Killmaster Killmaster - Art and Soul by Christopher R. Schnoor



"This beautifully illustrated biography is an in-depth study of John Killmaster's life and work as an artist and educator, written by author and art critic Christopher R. Schnoor. Killmaster is known worldwide as an innovator in enamel art, primarily creating large scale porcelain enamels, kiln-fired on steel panels in wall reliefs and freestanding sculpture, and contributing to the development of new enamel-based mediums. His mission has been to liberate enameling from being perceived as a minor craft, elevating it to its acceptance as fine art. Additionally, the book's wealth of images underscores his independent nature and sensibility in a range of mediums including gouache, acrylic and oil painting, work that has found itself in both museum and private collections. His unique aesthetic continues to inform his ongoing output."

I juried into NWDC 10 years ago, and have participated with the Education Committee, served as Secretary, and created the position of Volunteer Coordinator which I have held for nearly two years. I hope to bring this experience into serving the membership as the Board and Committee Chairs and volunteers build on the tremendous legacy of NWDC.





## Nancy Loorem Adams, Vice President

I am a life long art addict with intermingled experiences in art education, exhibitions, and of course creating my own art work, all sprinkled with numerous friends and associates in the art community in the Puget Sound region. I have a doctorate in leadership and organizational change. Whether in roles as Head of School at BAM, or President of the BAM Board while we raised millions to build our craft museum, or as the creator of Art's Cool! offering after school art classes and summer art camps with several NWDC members among the teachers, or as curator of recent exhibitions, I work with artists and art organizations to create new entities, exhibitions, and educational programs that pop.

Through the multitude of details of creating with organizations, I build life-long relationships and the kind of enthusiasm that people want to get in on. I have been a member of NWDC since 1994. At that time, I created wall pieces using quilt making techniques featuring heat-transferred color copies of some of my paperdolls collected when I was a girl. (Fun fact about me: I have all my paperdolls collected in the 50's – over 100 dolls with all their clothes.)

My work is in many collections, in the United States and overseas. Several years after joining the organization, I became a Board member.

I spent 2 years as Secretary, 4 years as President, and 4 years as Treasurer. During my Presidency Lynn DiNino proposed the Living Treasurers Project so I have been involved with that project since the beginning. Currently, I am involved with NWDC on the Living Treasurers Project about the life of Ron Ho and I am the current Treasurer. My current work is transitioning into a more paper based narrative, using hand sewing techniques and found objects.

## **NWDC's New Honorary Members**

#### Karen Lorene

For over forty years, Karen Lorene has supported local emerging and established jewelry artists with her Seattle gallery Faceré. She has published books and catalogs that have presented fine craft in a whole new light to new audiences, and has appeared on the popular PBS series *Antiques Roadshow*. She has also served for several years on the board of the Society of North American Metalsmiths.

The principles by which Karen Lorene runs her gallery are in the spirit of the NWDC mission. She is promoting the appreciation of excellence in design and craftsmanship by building a base of clients that she has educated to enjoy finely crafted jewelry art. Her efforts were recognized in 2010 when she received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Seattle Metals Guild for her exceptional support of contemporary jewelry arts. Last year, she gave a stimulating presentation on antique jewelry for our members at Phinney Center.

Karen has been an ongoing force behind the jewelry arts field nationwide and should be recognized by our group for this contribution. She has developed collections and nurtured the careers of numerous artists, including many NWDC members such as Ron Ho, Mary Lee Hu and Ramona Solberg, both locally and nationally.

## Kelly Lyles

Kelly Lyles is a Seattle artist of high visibility and popularity. She drives an art car, is a graphic artist and also shows her paintings/mixed media work regularly in the Seattle area and elsewhere. She earns a living as an artist by selling her work, being paid to show up in zany outfits, and teaching.

She's a known networker, not only to pursue her own career, but also to support other artists. For at least twenty years, she's forwarded emails from fellow artists having shows to her list of over 600 fellow art appreciators in order to promote the arts generally. She is very well connected in the community and an invaluable resource for suggesting places in which to exhibit. She's organized Cultural Exchanges by taking artist/art appreciator groups to Cuba, China, Budapest, and Berlin.

Twenty years ago, she initiated the annual Art Car Exhibit for the Fremont Fair and has continued to raise money and solicit art car owners from around the country to participate. Supporters are John and Mary Shirley, the Fremont Arts Council, Suzy Burke and others.

She's a permanent art supporter who promotes the arts in a very present, appropriate and visible way. She has already helped NWDC by enthusiastically advertising our new member application process this year, and she will continue to be an asset to our mission of educating the public as to the value of art in our lives.

## **NWDC's New Lifetime Member**

### **Dona Anderson**

Dona Anderson is a "living treasure" in our midst. A member of NWDC since 1980, Dona continues to be active in our programs while bringing her remarkable vision and talented creation of exceptional sculptural works of art to our exhibitions. Dona's commitment to furthering her craft through regular production of new and innovative works shown internationally, nationally and regionally, to this day, puts her in a class of artists who define NWDC as a premier fine craft and design organization.

The Living Treasures project was where Dona chose to contribute her time to carrying the torch of education and recognition of important artists and arts patrons' contributions to our region and beyond. Dona worked on several of the early productions, helping to raise funds while contributing her deep appreciation and knowledge for fine craft art and design to the productions.

Both Dona and her husband Bob advocated for fine craft art through their remarkable work to develop public art installations and programs in the City of Everett, and by their leadership in the development and fund-raising for the Schack Art Center. Dona, in particularly, played a key role in the Schack Art Center development. Her concern for young and emerging artists has been realized though the educational programs and facilities for learning at Schack. NWDC has exhibited at Schack recently and our members regularly exhibit, teach and participate in programs at Schack. The Anderson's commitment to the art community and advocacy reaches hundreds annually and will for decades to come.

# **Angel Fund Assists Those Who Need Help Paying Dues**

It's that time of year again when our dues help pay for all the amazing events NWDC sponsors each year. ## Ron Ho, A Jeweler's Journey Living Treasures Project Summary

This past year's Living Treasures Project (LTP) Committee activity built on the Board decision in 2016 to continue our NWDC's series of video profiles produced between 1998 to 2003. You can watch the 7 previous videos by following a link on our website (<a href="https://www.nwdesignercraftsmen.org">https://www.nwdesignercraftsmen.org</a>). These videos are important in fulfilling our educational mission to the public.

In the fall of 2016, after considering proposals from 4 filmmakers Fidget TV was chosen to create a video documentary on the life and art of Ron Ho. A funding goal of \$55,000 was established; this was considered enough to cover operating, production, and premier costs for the project.

In early Spring 2017, Ron Ho was diagnosed with a late stage of cancer. It was crucial to film Ron immediately while he still had the stamina to handle multiple interviews. Fidget was willing to begin filming Ron before we had all our funding in place.

Fundraising began in earnest. 200 letters were sent to potential donors, including NWDC membership, travelers with Ron on his tours, gallery owners, professional associates, and owners of Ron's jewelry. Several grants were applied for but declined. In the fall of 2017, the success of the Self-Portrait show enabled us to reach 107% of our fundraising goal.

Currently, the film is in post-production. It should be ready for review by the LTP Committee sometime in January.

Now, the Committee is planning the Premier of the documentary. The goal is for the Premier to be a fun experience. Contributing to this goal is ease of parking and theater-style viewing of our film, not to mention a special festive reception.

During this planning and fundraising, the LTP Committee has considered our next artist or art advocate to film. Several goals for this individual include a balance of media represented in our films and a proven record of being a leader, mentor and motivator of other artists, as well as an innovator in their field.

Our subject must be able to contribute first person interviews, not be the subject of a previous documentary, and have had their most influential period occur within our 5-state area of NWDC membership.

The Committee will soon establish a short-term (ad hoc) sub-committee from among our membership to select a nominee for the next video. That sub-committee will then present a nominee to the Board for approval. The goal is to select the next video subject by the end of the Winter quarter of 2018.

## **Self Portrait Show Fundraiser for Ron Ho Summary October 31 - November 5, 2017**

51 NWDC artist members were willing to make and donate a self portrait that would sell for \$200 in the exhibit designed as a fundraiser for Ron's video. There were 76 pieces in the show. Of these, three artists each donated not one, but two artworks. Also, 22 artists were selected from outside our group because of their high profiles in the community, and because they were willing to donate. The thinking was that we'd broaden our buying audience by showing 'known' art while making pieces affordable to the artists themselves. On top of everything else, it was a really beautiful show.

Excitement built during the preview days, enabling browsers to submit a free lottery ticket

by listing pieces they'd be interested in purchasing. We used the lottery system in order to quiet a buying stampede for certain artworks valued at many times the \$200 ticket price.

Finally, on Sunday November 5<sup>th</sup> we had an audience of about 60-70 purchasers - impatient, excited and eager to have THEIR tickets drawn. It took us only two hours to sell all except nine artworks. These nine pieces were equally compelling but we wore our audience out during the buying frenzy, apparently.





Our expenses included a printed postcard, some show-hanging necessities, beverages and nuts for the show party, and credit card charges. We earned a little over \$12,000, and maybe just as importantly, brought attention and credibility to our group, Northwest Designer Craftsmen, and to the *Living Treasures* video series.

Besides a giant thank you to our own donating artists, we'd like to thank those who helped at the event: Liza Halvorson, Miriam Works, Gretchen Echols, Ron Pascho, Monica Street, Natascha Bybee, Peter Olson, Jeanne Marie and Bob Thomas. We'd like to

thank Mike Peck who loaned us his gallery for a week and a big thank you to Larry Metcalf and Larry Halvorson for hanging the show! Thanks also to Cheryl Leo Gwin for helping us with promotion and to Jan Koutsky and Loren Lukens for design work on the postcard. Thank you Yasmine Rafii for designing the lottery ticket and donating the printing, paper and cutting. (It takes a village). . . Afterwards, the committee reviewed our effort and compiled all related show organization documents for an archival record to use as a guide for our next fundraising effort.

## 2018 NWDC Operating Budget Review

In December, your Board of Directors approved an operating budget for 2018. This budget reflects the programs and priorities for the coming year. It gives you an idea how your dues are spent within the organization. A large chunk of our annual income goes toward fixed expenses. These include items such as insurance, Website expenses and software licensing fees. In other categories, the items represent NWDC's many plans for programs and social events for 2018. This operating budget results in a shortfall between anticipated income from member dues and estimated expenses. Fortunately, funds have carried over from 2017 to cover the shortfall this year. The Angel Fund and the Living Treasures Project operate under separate budgets not shown here.

   This project was largely self-funded through donations and sales of donated art.

  these scholarships to support them in attending conferences or workshops they
  could not otherwise afford.
- Executive Committee and Board meetings over video feed so that any NWDC member can attend more easily than before. Some of these meetings will be held face to face too.
- A streamlined process for keeping your Member Profile up to date on the Web page. With many new pages added to the Web Site, it is fast becoming the "go to" place for participating in NWDC.
- Application for **NWDC exhibitions** through the Web Site.
