

How to submit information about what you've been up to, to the NWDC newsletter:

With the NWDC newsletter moving to a digital form at, information that you'd like to have included in the newsletter needs to be ready to layout. Here's a Q & A to help you make sure that what you provide is ready to include:

What's appropriate to include? Anything recent or upcoming about you and/or your art that you want NWDC members to know. For instance exhibits, classes/workshops, art or studio sales, studio space, opportunities, etc. would all be appropriate. Be sure to include basic information, i.e. who, what, why, when (dates and times), where (include city and state), how, etc. Website addresses are especially welcome. The newsletter can now link directly to them if you hover the cursor over a website or e-mail address and then click on it. How should the text be formatted? In plain text, Arial font, size 10. Form at it so it's ready to copy and paste into the newsletter. Please don't make us have to distill your info down to its essence. Attached documents are better, rather than in the body of the e-mail. Please use doc format if sending a Word document instead of docx format. Not everyone has Office 2008 yet, so docx files can't be opened by folks. using an older version of Word. Use correct punctuation. If it's not formatted correctly it will not be included.

What about images? We want images, but they must be formatted correctly. All images must be no larger than 350 pixels wide and high, 72 dpi, and must be jpeg form at. Please include titles, medium, dimensions, etc.,

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

I'm responding to this list of options since I don't know if I will be able to attend the meeting on the 30th. I will try, but I might have an artist from China in tow if I do come.

But for now, here's my response:

I feel that the more professional but open the better. So I like option 6 which is to hire a professional and unbiased jury. I would like to see an open competition or call for entry rather than a sponsorship. We are missing out on too many talented artists when we restrict ourselves to sponsors. And perhaps that call can require an entry fee (restricting qualifications to NW Artists) to help defray some costs associated with the call and/or jurying process.

But to add to that (aside from jurying artists in), I'd like to see us have membership open to others who can help support the organization. Maybe new categories of membership such as:

- * Professional Artists (Juried)
- * Arts Professionals (architects, interior designers, art consultants, graphic designers, museum and gallery professionals, etc)
 - * Students (college art)
- * Supporters (donors, collectors, volunteers, and sponsors)

I like the idea where the artists who make the work, and don't have to multi-task doing everything else as well, but that there is a support group to do just that...support. That support group can strengthen our base, and encourage interest in our organization and our work. Maybe one of our socials can "Celebrate the sponsors" so that they become a part of who we are. Maybe we can have a student competition where they are juried by a group of their own peers so they learn how the system works in the real world.

Now for the out of state folks. I think by opening applications up, we can email them and ask them to encourage their friends to apply (without sponsorship). That way we can expand membership in those states and hopefully have their own local meetings. I think an annual meeting would be great and bring them all together for a conference and show. It would be a generator of money for us as well as showcase NWDC.

I think the above scenario might take us to the next level (it's time). And good use of social networking can help us accomplish that.

Rebecca, I don't know how to participate in the discussions going on in the NWDC. I feel like when I get to the January meeting, I'm going to be presented with some choices without having heard a variety of people on the subjects. I am sending this note to you—how do I get involved in open discussion? I really would like to hear other opinions on the subject. I feel like I'm trying to figure out how to take part in a discussion that seems to be going on, but I'm not just sure where it is taking place. Among the board members, who are working hard to figure out some solutions to problems, and among small groups of likeminded people, maybe among groups of people working in the same media. But how do those of us who want to hear a variety of opinions get into a broader discussion of the issues, preferably before the January meeting?

I certainly have some thoughts about the jurying process, that I'd like to share.

In looking over the mission statement for the NWDC and then reading Carol's letter "Art on Trial", I agree with Carol that the mission of the group is not to be in the jurying business. However, the first part of the mission statement says that we were founded "to promote excellence of design and craftsmanship and to promote public appreciation and interest in fine craft." There are definitely two parts to that mission statement. Since promoting excellence of design and craftsmanship is stated first, I don't want to lose track of that mission. It seems to me to set the basis from which we can then go out and do our educating and promoting to the public.

I've belonged to a number of arts/crafts organizations through the years and (since we lived in various places) organizations throughout the country. Some are very much geographically 'local', some are national, some are international. NWDC is the first that has truly made me feel like I have some professional standing. And part of that comes as a result of the jurying process, with the extension of that being the NWDC exhibitions which we present. All sorts of professional workers go through a "jurying process" --nurses, lawyers, doctors, teachers, electricians—all have some sort of state board, bar exams and/or licensing—and for those people the exams must be passed before they may even work in their field. We at least have a choice of whether to go through such a process.

As I sit through the jurying process I am amazed at the fact that I am a member. It is a stiff hurdle that we foster, no doubt about that. I find myself thinking "Would I have liked to sit in on the discussion of my work? Would I have been elated or would I have cringed?" But each time I participate I find the process educational. I like the discussions, and I do feel that when it is over, we have added craftspeople with strong knowledge of their materials and processes, and with an equally strong commitment to fine craftsmanship. One of the dismaying aspects of some unjuried organizations is the lack of the foregoing qualities. Poor craftsmanship, and evidence of "tossing on some enamel" (in the case of my own field) with no grounding in the intrinsic quality of the materials, when they are appropriate, or skill in applying them—and then presenting them to the public for their appreciation and education—defeats the educational aspect of the organization.

I am proud to be part of a professional organization. When we first returned to the Northwest, one of the first questions asked by galleries was if I was a member of the NWDC. It was very obvious that the organization carried a lot of weight in the area.

I have never considered the NWDC to be in the jurying business, but I do feel strongly that jurying for membership is a necessary part of the process in the organization's work to fulfill the mission of being committed to promoting excellence of design and craftsmanship. I would hate to see us give up this process. If the main reason for giving it up is because we don't have a much bigger membership, I don't find that a valid reason. It is certainly possible that consideration should be given to honing or changing the process, but it is a process that we need to continue in some way.
